





THE INAUGURAL ADDRESS OF
PRESIDENT DONALD HANEY McLAUGHLIN

resident Donald McLaughlin delivered the following inaugural address at the twelfth annual installation dinner. Don was re-elected to a second term in November.

"Compatriots and Guests,

1992 was an interesting and challenging year for our chapter and for me as your President. I am looking forward to having another like year, and am honored to be your President for 1993. Thank you for this opportunity. I anticipate that 1993 will see the San Fernando Valley Chapter again recognized as the viable and visible organization that has been consistently identified by our State and National Societies as a leader in advancing the principles and programs to which the Sons of the American Revolution are dedicated.

What did we accomplish in 1992? First we increased our membership by 25%. We moved from medium sized to large sized Chapter in California, and were runner-up for the large size Chapter award at the Board of Managers' meeting in Sunnyvale last November. With the current number of applicants being processed and those who have expressed an interest in joining I believe that we will come close to again having a 25% increase in membership. Third, we now have the nucleus for three branches in the Santa Clarita Valley, Antelope Valley, and Ridgecrest. We will be reporting soon on the formation of one of those branches. These three significant achievements were reported to you in the Valley Compatriot.

Now for 1993. What are the challenges for our Chapter and

you that will be of personal satisfaction to all of us as members of this Chapter. Our first activity will again be the Massing of the Colors, commemorating George Washington's Birthday, February 21, at Forest Lawn, in Burbank. I am certain you have read of this in the Valley Compatriot, and hope that you will support this event with your attendance. If you have not attended one in the past, I promise that you will be most impressed when you witness these ceremonies. This is the largest commemoration of Washington's birth on the West coast.

Following soon after the Massing of the Colors will be the State Annual Meeting of the Membership, 16 and 17 April, at the new Red Lion Inn in Glendale. Our Chapter is hosting this meeting which will have delegates from all the Chapters in the State. In addition, the President-General, Paul H. Walker will attend. Here you will see the Sons of the American Revolution at the grass roots level. This promises to be an outstanding meeting, together with the social interaction you will enjoy. However, we need your help in preparing and manning for this event. To date three of our new members have volunteered to help. But, we need more volunteers. I also will be calling and requesting help. Our second planning session for the April meeting was held a week ago. At that meeting which included State Officers of the Ladies Auxiliary all committee chairs were filled by volunteers. The organization chart will be published in the next Valley Compatriot. Please select that function you would like to be a part of and plan to attend the next meeting.

We also have an interesting agenda of speakers committed through June for our monthly meetings, so make your reservations early to hear these persons. At our February meeting we will have Jan Jennings, a world wide recognized genealogist and whose husband has applied for membership in our Chapter.

For this next year I wish to add another ingredient to our full but tasty menu. The challenge to this Chapter and other Chapters in the State to Participate in "The Second American Revolution". At the State Board of Managers Meeting in Sunnyvale, last November, we heard an address by a dual member of our Chapter and former State President, Colonel Thomas D. Gillis. A major portion of his remarks was printed in the December issue of the Valley Compatriot. I hope that all of you who read it had the same positive response that I did. Colonel Tom's address was entered into the meeting as a plan of action and was accepted. There were 24 specific items that Colonel Tom identified requiring attention. Two of these issues related to the youth of this Country - crime and drugs.

I sincerely believe that all of us recognize that the youth are our greatest asset for the future of this Country, and that we need to join together in providing an all out effort to support PREVENTATIVE ASSISTANCE to community activities and organizations that are in the forefront of WINNING OVER AT RISK YOUTH.

During the past three months I have been investigating how the Sons of the American Revolution can make a significant part in the WINNING OVER OF AT-RISK YOUTH. This involved meeting with Judge Floyd Baxter, Presiding Judge of the Newhall District Municipal Court.

In addition I also met with the Chief Deputy District Attorney for the Newhall Court District and have attended the last three meetings of the Santa Clarita Gang Task Force, Los Angeles County Sheriffs Office. All of these meetings have been eye openers. Parents, school officials students, community leaders business leaders, Law enforcement officers, and other interested citizens are banding together to be certain that their children and their school mates are being influenced to be good citizens.

Several weeks ago I met with the Executive Director of the Boys and Girls Club of Santa Clarita Valley. The club was chartered in New York in 1906 as the Boys Club of America. The Charter was changed in 1991 to the current name and now has 1100 plus clubs in the United States. The Santa Clarita Valley Club was founded in 1969 as the Newhall-Saugus Boy's Club.

The Boys and Girls Club serves the youth of the community by providing positive alternatives which offset various community conditions, such as low income, single parent home situations, latchkey children, etc. The Club is non-profit, non-sectarian Guidance, cultural, educational and recreational center which serves boys and girls ages 7 to 17. It is dedicated to a program consisting of social adjustment, social development, and prevention which strives to help young people feel good about themselves by providing positive alternatives and values and principles. The Santa Clarita Club has a current membership of over 1100 children with attendance averaging nearly 250 boys and girls per day. This is an on-going program which has goals compatible with the S.A.R., and to which I wish to provide the support of the Chapter.

How do we do this? The National and State Societies award system provides an avenue for this. Our Good Citizenship medals are available for both students and advisors in this type of program. In addition our law enforcement commendation medal is awarded in recognition of outstanding achievement in like programs where local law enforcement officers are involved.

In addition, we can provide volunteer assistance in training programs on location at the centers. The Santa Clarita Boys and Girls Club will soon have a computer training center and we already have signals that one of our members has indicated willingness to provide training in that discipline. This type of participation stretches the imagination of how we might expand our efforts to assist the youths of the Club. How about a basic course in Genealogy? Who knows, we may have potential members among the youth of these Clubs.

Part of the Club's activities include field trips. Jim Ventress Director of the Santa Clarita Club is hoping to have a group of his members attend the Massing of the Colors. One of our members has volunteered to provide transportation to those boys and girls who wish to attend.

I sincerely believe that, in line with Colonel Tom's proposed program, and as a derivative of Bob Emrey's "War on Drugs", AN OUNCE OF PREVENTION IS WORTH A POUND OF CURE!. We have an opportunity and challenge to participate in the SECOND AMERICAN REVOLUTION. I am setting this as a new goal to seed this participation in what will eventually be the home of of the Santa Clarita Branch of our Chapter. and which, hopefully, will spread to other California Chapters and eventually as a National Society, S.A.R. program.

As any new program or product is designed and put into production there is always a learning period to test the effectiveness of the results in a new environment. This will also apply to working with the boys and girls Club in the Santa Clarita Valley. However, I can assure you that the Director has welcomed our interest and participation. I also look forward to becoming closer involved in their activities. In addition I welcome suggestions and advise from all of our members that will assist in helping to win over the "At-Risk Youth" and add to the program proposed by Colonel Gillis, becoming part of "THE SECOND AMERICAN REVOLUTION".

AMERICAN HISTORY
LOSES AGAIN!



California has adopted new history books with emphasis on cultural diversity with a view other than Western European. Jim Pardue, one of the book selection committee, says: "...biographies of dead war heroes are out. Profiles of such diverse characters as modern author Yoshiko Uchida and Puerot Rican baseball player Roberto Clemente, along with many non-famous Americans are in. The new books contain much more on African and Egyptian civilizations." Exercises include "If you were a Cherokee, how might you have felt about settlers moving into your hunting grounds?" or "Compare a Southern plantation mansion with a slave's quarters."

APRIL 15th, 16th and 17th



Work has begun on the decoration, programs, entertainment, the banquets, special dinners, arrangements for the President General, invitations to special guests.


