

Twenty-Four years ago, our Chapter deployed it's newly formed Color Guard to the National Congress, held that year at Tyson Corners, Virginia (just outside Washington,

D.C. Prior to our participation the National Society was hard pressed to field a complete Color Guard. Usually Maryland, Massachusetts and New Jersey would combine and furnish

five or six guardsmen.

We continued to attend the National events, and in 1989. President General Charlie Prinz, and incoming President General Jim Westlake, established the National Color Guard Committee, appoint your editor as National Color Guard Commander

With the able assis-

tance of some dedicated guardsmen, and the publishing of "The SAR Guardsman", encouraging the establishment of Color Guards, the movement has grown to where most Chapters now have Color Guards. Here in California the growth was pheromonal. Our participation at National continued and the influence is all the more obvious when three

of the seven National Commanders have been Californians. Additionally, those California Compatriots participating at the National level agreed to wear the same historically correct

### General George Washington The First Director of Counterintelligence

The American Revolution was not only a revolt but a war of counterintelligence. From the first days of the rebellion it was 'intelligence' that dictated the actions of both sides. British General Sir Thomas Gage learned that the colonials were hiding their military stores in the town of Concord, Massachusetts. The Massachusetts Committee of Safety learned that Gage intended to launch a sizeable force and siege said stores, hence Paul Revere, et al, famous ride to warn the colonists.

Throughout the entire war the gathering
TALLMADGE of intelligence was paramount to planning,
WASHINGTON'S and this applied to both the Americans and
SPY MASTER
Crown's forces. With the Royal Navy dominating the seas, the British had the advantage of mobility,
whereas, General Washington's forces were forced to wait
and react to the British movements.

The importance of intelligence was so great that Washington decided that he would personally

control the American intelligence efforts, and keep it tightly controlled and on a need to know basis only. Washington once wrote: "There is one evil I dread and that is their spies."

Greatly influencing General Washington's thinking in regards to protecting those involved in intelligence gathering was the capture and execution of Connecticut Captain Nathan Hale, on a mission for the General.

The Continental Congress also realized the importance of intelligence, and in the very beginning formed a Committee of Secret Correspondence. On November 9th, 1775, Congress required all Congressman to sign an oath of secrecy, in which they pledged to keep all matters before that body secret which were deemed so by said delegates. Said oath had teeth - it's final

sentence read: "And if any member shall violate this agreement, he shall be expelled from this Congress, and deemed an enemy to the liberties of America, and liable to be treated as such . . . ." On June 12th, 1776 they extended it to require all employees of the Continental Congress to sign it. The penalty for gathering intelligence, better stated as being a spy, was death by hanging. It was therefore extremely important for the safety of the spys and the intelligence network as a whole to develop methods of concealing the identity of the spies and their methods of transmitting information.

After the British captured New York City and turned it into an island bastion, a network of spies was created. A trusted Continental Officer, Brigadier General Charles Scott, a Virginian, Commander of the 5<sup>th</sup> and later 2<sup>nd</sup> Virginia Continental Regiments, and in 1808 the Fourth Governor of Kentucky. In 1778,


owing to bad health, he asked Washington to replace him, recommending John Bolton be his replacement. The identify of those in Washington's intelligence network were so closely held, that General Scott did not know that John Bolton

was the alias for Major Benjamin Tallmadge.

Tallmadge was named his replacement and is acknowledged to be the father of the American Intelligence Service. He, like Scott, reported directly to Washington and was responsible for it's operation. Tallmadge was a neighbor and close friend of Nathan Hale, and his loss no doubt greatly influenced his thinking. As a result of this concern he developed a system of identifying his spies. Each spy would chose an alias, known but to the spy, Tallmadge, Washington, and the Aide-de-Camp assisting him. One the alias was decided upon, only the first and last letter of that name would be used in correspondence. Robert Townsend, a merchant in New York used the alias of Culper, Junior

- C\_\_r. His confederate, Abraham Woodhull, alias

Samuel Culper, was known as Culper, Senior. Others that were known to the community they operated in did not conceal their identity, and in some instances conveyed the gathered intelligence themselves. This was at considerable risk,

as both the Americans and British were constantly searching for spies. One, an American patriot, Enoch Crosby, a shoemaker by trade, was suspected while operating in New York. He escaped to the American lines and was reassigned to Albany.

Being a spy in the 18th century was not considered honorable service by most people, hence even after contributing greatly to the attainment of American independence, these patriots choose to remain anonymous. Robert Townsend's identify was not discovered until 1939, when New York historian Morton Pennypacker recognized the handwriting of Culper Junior and Robert Townsend were one and the same!

Others were simply brave to a point of being reckless. One such officer was Captain Allan McLane. When seeking information on the fortification and garrison at Stony Point, he disguised himself as a countryman, and under the cover of escorting a Mrs. Smith there to see her sons, he spent two weeks within the Fort. When American General "Mad" Anthony Wayne launched the night attack on the fortress, it was carried with a minimum of losses on the part of the Americans thanks to McLane's information

The majority of intelligence had to be transmitted in writing, and numerous methods were developed to do so. One, extremely difficult to decipher, was created by Major Tallmadge, using two copies of John Entick's "New Latin and English Dictionary", published in 1771. The spy would write down the number of the page, then

the number of the line, and finally, the number of the chosen word. The recipient would then simply transcribe the numbers back to words. Without knowing what books were used, it was impossible to break.

Major Tallmadge created another unique and almost impossible code to break. He listed 763 words, numbered 1 thru 763. Each number represented a single word. As an

example, 38 meant attack, New York was 127, George Washington was 711, British Sir Henry Clinton, 721, Culper Senior 723, Culper Junior The code was so simple, and so safe, that by 1783, John Adams, John Jay, Robert Livingston and Robert Morris were using it. Here again, without a copy of the Tallmadge list, it was impossible

to decipher.

More sophisticated methods were also used. One of these methods of transmitting intelligence was the use of "white ink". On July 25th, 1779 Washington wrote to Major Benjamin Tallmadge, a very descriptive letter concerning the operation:

"West Point, July 25,1779

Sir,

All the white Ink I now have (indeed all that there is any prospect of getting soon) is sent in Phial No. 1 by Colo. Webb. The liquid in No. 2 is the Counterpart which renders the other visible by wetting the paper with a fine brush af-


> send these to C---- r Junior as soon as possible and I beg that no mention may ever be made of your having received such liquids from me or any one else. In all cases and at all times this prudence and circumspection is necessary but it is indispensably so now as I am informed that Governor Tryon, has a preparation of the same kid, or something similar to it which may lead to a detection of it is ever known that a matter of this sort has passed from me. . . . . "

The 'white ink" Washington referred to was a compound of cobalt chloride, glycerine and water. Dr. James Jay, brother of John Jay, developed what was called "Sympathetic Stain", which he used to send information from London to America. He supplied a quantity of the chemical to Silas Deane, alias Timothy Jones, in

Paris, and to George Washington, thereby permitting secret communication between them. In a letter written by Robert Morris to John Jay, he wrote regarding a letter received from Timothy Jones: "concealed beauties therein . . . . a cursory examination of a sea captain would never discover them, but transferred from his hand to the penetrating eye of John Jay, the diamonds stand confessed at once".

On July 25th, 1779 Washington wrote to Major Benjamin Tallmadge, who ran the New York Intelligence network, a very descriptive letter concerning the operation.

Even members of Washington's military family (his staff) were restricted from knowing the intimacies of the operations - it was on a need to know basis. The General relied on the talent of Lieutenant Colonel Hamilton to coordinate

the gathered intelligence and to report his conclusions, directly to and only to the General. To a lesser degree, Major Caleb Gibbs, Commadant of the Commander-in-Chief's Guards was involved. Among his numerous duties, he was the keeper of the headquarters accounts, Gibbs had to enter the intelligence networks expenses. He did so without disclosing any vital information. As an example, on October 16th, 1780, his ledger shows an entry: "Paid Maj. Tallmadge, towards the expense of the communications with New York by the way of Long Island" A second entry reads: "Aug. 1. Secret Service - £ 146".

One interesting method of signaling that a message was ready to be picked up was accomplished by patriot Anna Strong. She would hang out her laundry, if a black petticoat was on the line it meant a message was ready for pick up, then the number of handkerchiefs hung would indicate which cove on Long Island Sound the agents would meet.

Concealing the intelligence being sent was extremely important, but so was the ability of deciphering the enemies communications. In early 1775, Elbridge Gerry of Massachusetts, and later Vice President of the United States, aided by Elisha Potter and the Reverend Samuel West, decrypted an intercepted letter which disclosed that Doctor Benjamin Church of the Massachusetts Committee of Safety, was a spy for General Gage.

The British were not asleep at the espionage game. They developed some very

sophisticated codes as well. One that was not only unique, but had to have been very difficult to compose required it be read through a mask. This technique is known as the Cardan system, named for Geronimo Cardano, a 16th Century code creator. A message was written within the shape of the mask, then the beginning and ending of each line carefully added so that the entire letter made sense. But, when only the portion outlined by the mask was read an entirely different message was viewed. In Sir Henry Clinton's letter sent to General Burgoyne, during his attempt to capture the Hudson River by invading from Canada, it exaggerates the recent successes of British arms, however, when the mask is applied, we read a different story. Instead of attacking northward, to link up with Burgovne's southward attack, General Sir William Howe chose to drive toward Philadelphia. Sir Henry's message addresses this in a negative way.

"I own to you that I think Sr. W's move just at this time the worst he could take."

When militia Sergeant Moses Harris of New York, by a stroke of luck, fell in with a group of exhausted Tories and was recruited to serve as a loyalist courier, he took the communications directly to American Major General Philip Schuyler, who opened them without breaking the wax seal. He had the messages copied, and permitted Harris to continue on as a courier. The information gleamed by this good fortune and the bravery of Moses Harris, enable Schuyler and George Washington to know what was being communi-

cated between General Sir Henry Clinton and General John Burgoyne who was leading an army south from Canada. This information informed Schuyler about British Colonel Barry St. Ledger's planned attack on Fort Stanwix. He immediately sent reenforcements to that Fort, which resulted in the ultimate defeat of St. Ledger's attack. (An in depth article on Moses Harris is on our web site entitled: "Sergeant Moses Harris - Double Agent".)

During the treason of General Benedict Arnold, it was Major Tallmadge's involvement that prevented British Major John Andre from possibly escaping his capture by the ploy set up by Arnold. Andre had been captured by three New York Militiamen, travelling as John Anderson. Tallmadge, in his memoir, published in 1858, stated he deliberately omitted "some things relating to the detention of Andre". We will never know for sure what those "things" were.

However we do know that Sarah Townsend, Robert's sister, reported that she overheard Major Andre mention West Point and mentioned John Anderson. That information was given to Tallmadge, making him aware that there was a connection.

Later in 1781, patriot James Lovell, deciphered the encryption method employed by the British. An intercepted dispatch from General Lord Comwallis, besieged at Yorktown to Sir Henry Clinton, in New York, disclosed how desperate his situation was.

A second dispatch deciphered by Lovell, provided Washington knowledge that the British had sent a fleet south from New York to challenge the blockading French fleet. This knowledge permitted French Admiral De Grasse to prepare for a sea battle, and was successful in driving off the relief effort, thereby sealing Comwallis' doom.




