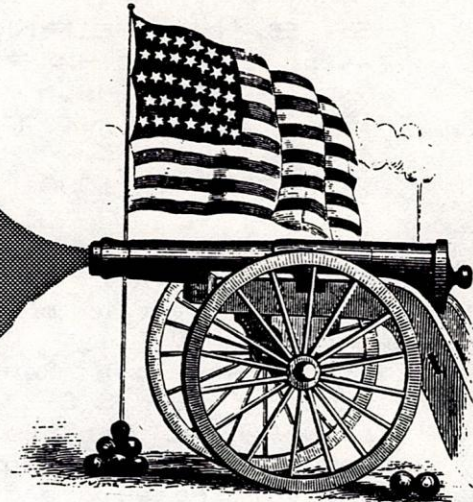


On June 9th, 1906 Compa-

PROGRAM



The San Fernando Valley Chapter, Sons of the American Revolution is justly proud of its wide range of service programs. The Reserve Officers Training Corp (R.O.T.C.) is a shining example. Under the leadership of President Audel Hicks, our support of the National sponsored program has exceeded all expectations. The program is divided into 2 separate categories, The Junior R.O.T.C. (high school level) and Senior R.O.T.C. (college level). The medal is given to a Cadet or Midshipman, selected by his Commanding Officer for "demonstrating leadership ability, soldierly bearing and overall excellence." A cadet or midshipman may only be presented the medal once, and only one medal is given annually to each school, with the exception of those schools which have a completely separate summer program. The medals are much coveted by the Cadets.

ESTABLISHING NEW CHAPTERS

Everyone agrees that the establishment of new chapters is a good idea, and at the same time, everyone agrees that the taking such action is a very difficult and expensive task. The primary objection is the splitting up of existing chapters. In most cases dividing an existing chapter is in itself a negative. It reduces the membership and financial base from which the Chapter operates. Two small ineffective chapters in lieu of one effective one does not serve the S.A.R.'s purpose.

The San Fernando Valley Chapter approved supporting the establishment of a much needed new chapter in neighboring Antelope Valley with its population of 250,000 and being sixty-five miles from the San Fernando Valley it has found it to be a far more difficult task than expected. The Chapter is understandably reluctant to attempt to underwrite the costs associated with such an act. It is equally reluctant to transfer a portion of its fifty-plus membership. These objections are nothing new to the S.A.R. and generally explain why the growth of Chapters is so slow.

However, in keeping with the San Fernando Valley Chapter's traditional "Can Do" attitude a workable solution has been found.

The establishment of a new Chapter is undertaken in defined stages. The first stage is the establishment of a "BRANCH" of the Chapter.

As a "Branch" Chapter, its members are on the active membership roster of the San Fernando Valley Chapter. As such they receive the Chapter's

Newsletter (enhanced to cover the "Branch" activities), can attend the parent Chapter's meetings as well as their own, and are represented by the parent Chapter at State and National. Their new membership applications would be processed by the parent Chapter.

But, most importantly, the "Branch" would not be under time related pressure to become a separately chartered Chapter. The ten (10) members required to start a new chapter can be ignored until the "Branch" and parent Chapter feels comfortable in making the final separation.

An additional positive is they would have the opportunity to learn in the "organization" and "ways" of the S.A.R. under the guidance of the parent Chapter and not have to apply the principles of "trial and error" in their early operations.

The "Branch" Chapter would elect its own officers, however, they would have no standing at parent Chapter, State or National, except as regular members.

In the unlikely event the effort to establish the new chapter should fail, the S.A.R. loses nothing as it has risked nothing. The new membership is protected by the parent Chapter. Whereas, experience as shown us that when a newly formed Chapter is 'closed' the majority of its membership is lost to the S.A.R.

We believe that the concept of "Branch" Chapter should be given careful consideration by the State Society as it offers a workable solution to a long standing S.A.R. problem.

3. REPORT ON OUR MEMBERSHIP

1. THE FEBRUARY MEETING MINUTES

IT WAS MOVED by Compatriot Roger E. Robertson and SECONDED by Compatriot James A. McKellep that the minutes of the February 27th meeting be accepted as submitted. THE MOTION CARRIED.

2. THE REPORT OF THE TREASURER

Treasurer Robert C. Emrey reported that the collection of dues was behind with seven (7) Compatriots not having been received. The Chapter's permanent fund is now at \$7,426.00, however, the Chapter's general treasury is very low.

3. REPORT ON THE PERMANENT FUND

Trustee Roger E. Robertson reported that our Permanent Fund which is invested in Capitol Preservations, is earning 7.6% interest. Under the terms and conditions established by the Chapter as guidelines for the Permanent Fund, only fifty (50%) percent of the interest earned can be transferred to the General Fund. At the funds present level (\$7,426.00) that amounts to the equivalent of the dues for twenty-seven (27) chapter members without the usual membership expenses which

4. REPORT OF THE VETERAN'S
AFFAIRS COMMITTEE

Chairman Berni K. Campbell reported that no books were delivered in March. We will resume making deliveries to the four (4) V.A. Hospitals in April

5. THE SAR'S WAR ON DRUGS

After an exchange of many good ideas, IT WAS MOVED by Donald N. Moran and SECONDED by Berni K. Campbell that former President Robert C. Emrey be appointed founding Chairman of the San Fernando Valley Chapter's "WAR ON DRUGS" Committee.

President Audel H. Hicks appointed Compatriots Moran, Semerau to the Committee.

Said Committee to immediately prepare a resolution to be presented to the State Society, S.A.R. at their April 1990 meeting to join with us in declaring war on drugs. A similar resolution to be submitted to the National Society, S.A.R. at their June Congress.

Said Committee will prepare a list of individuals from all walks of the judicial sector, law enforcement, Educators and student leaders of "Student's against drugs" that are deserving of recognition for their efforts in fighting the drug problem. Those in Law Enforcement are to be presented the S.A.R.'s Law Enforcement Medal, the Educators and students will be presented the S.A.R.'s good citizenship medal

Extra effort is to be given to obtaining maximum publicity in recognizing these citizens.

6. OUR EAGLE SCOUT PROGRAM

Our Eagle Scout Scholarship contest winner, William Lugg has been named winner of the State Society, S.A.R.'s contest and will receive his state trophy at San Jose. William has also been named WINNER OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY'S SCHOLARSHIP! and will be going to Louisville, Kentucky in June to claim his \$4,000.00 scholarship. WELL DONE!

7 ANNUAL DUES COLLECTION

Secretary Donald Moran advised that we have lost a number of Compatriots this year. One transferred to the Pennsylvania Society, and eight were dropped for non-payment of dues. Efforts are continuing to renew them all

8. NEW CONCEPT-BRANCH CHAPTERS

Secretary Donald Moran proposed that the Chapter adopt guidelines for establishing "Branch Chapters". The purpose is to overcome some of the more difficult aspects of forming a new Chapter. Under this concept a Chapter would be permitted to establish a "Branch" in a new area. That Branch would be operate semi-autonomously under the "umbrella" furnished it by the parent Chapter. The Branch Chapter's members would be members of the parent Chapter, which would be responsible for processing their membership applications. In this way the Branch Chapter would be under no pressure to become a Chapter in its own right, nor would there be any concern over the "Branch" being able to maintaining the arbitrary membership number of ten (10) members to continue to existence. Ten members are not enough to maintain a Chapter,

but in this manner, they can grow at a realistic rate. Additionally, by serving with the parent Chapter, the Branch members can become familiar with the S.A.R. Lastly, the Branch Chapter would not be represented at the State level, accept thru the parent Chapter.

We believe that this system will provide the motivations to encourage S.A.R. growth.

9. REPORT ON THE CALIFORNIA SOCIETY'S 1990 PRESIDENT'S AWARD CONTEST.

President Audel H. Hicks advised that for the 1989/1990 year, the San Fernando Valley Chapter has amassed an impressive 43,480 points in the State wide contest.

10. THE CASSAR GENERAL MEETING

State President Arthur Wm. Barrett reported on the forthcoming State meeting in San Jose on April 27th and 28th. He stressed the need for Chapter participation.

11. THE GENEALOGICAL JAMBOREE

The Chapter will again man a booth at the 21st Annual Genealogical Jamboree. This major event will be held on May 6th, 1990, 9:30 A.M. until 4:30 P.M. at the Exhibition Building, 300 East Green Street, Pasadena. We will need volunteers to help man it.
