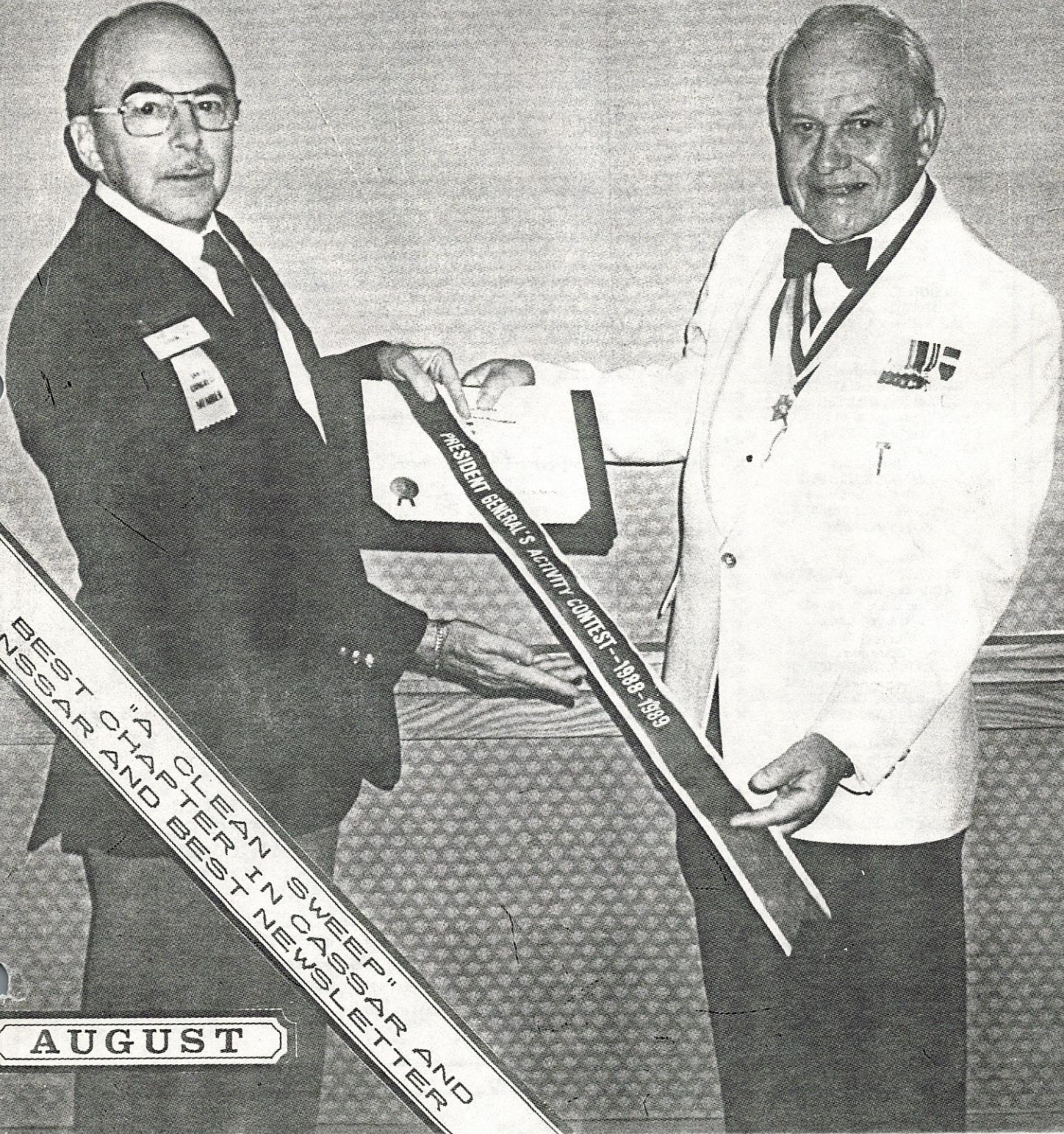

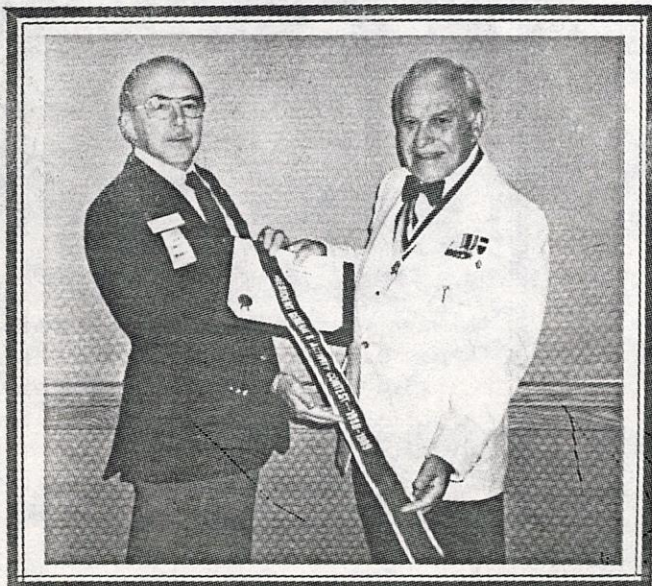

The contest is divided into three categories, Small, Mid-sized and Large chapters. With +450 Chapters this is an achievement to be proud of.

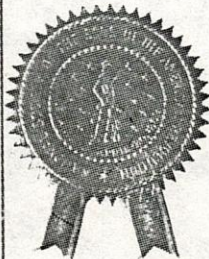

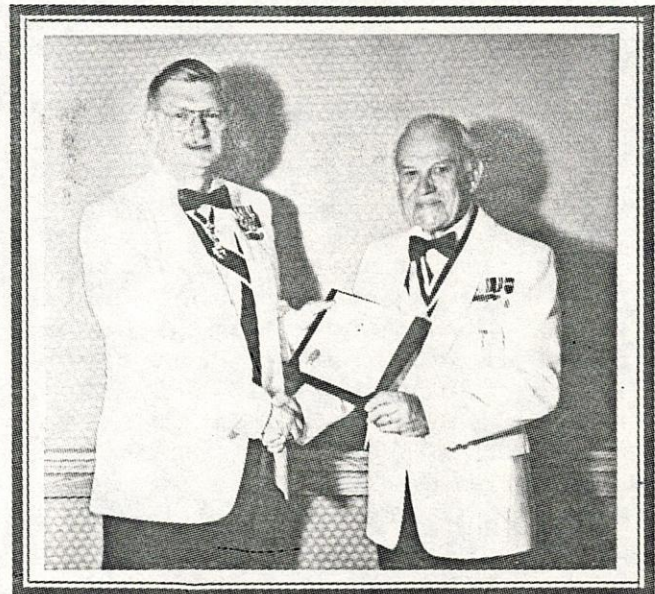

he 99th Congress S.A.R. National Congress opened with the California Society, S.A.R. hosting a reception. Since this is the 100th Anniversary of the founding of S.A.R. The State Society provided a birthday cake and what a cake it was, seven feet long and three feet wide. President General Charles F. Printz and State President Arthur Wm. Barrett had the honor of making the first cut using a real Revolutionary War sword furnished by our chapter. Immediately following the reception the California Society held a special meeting of the Board managers to elect Charles D. Conyers Vice President and our own Roger E. Robertson a Trustee of the California Society's Permanent

Fund. Roger immediately introduced a resolution to permit the Society to invest in the Capitol Preservation Fund. Sound familiar?

Sunday started off with a special concert by the United States Navy band from Treasure Island at Huntington Park on Nob Hill. Joining the S.A.R.'s combined Color Guards was San Fernando Valley Chapter's Washington Guards, and a second three man Inter-service Color Guard. At the conclusion of the concert, led by the Color Guards, we all went over to the

magnificent Grace Cathedral for the Memorial Services. Both the Nob Hill Massing of the Colors and the Flag pageant at the Cathedral were led by the Congress's Color Guard Chairman

Monday Morning opened with a concert by the Sixth Army Band with the opening ceremonies again led by the combined S.A.R. Following dinner was Recognition Night (Award Presentations) California Society and it's compatriots did well. Charles Vencill was awarded the much coveted Minutemen Medal the highest honor the S.A.R. can bestow on a member. The CASSAR was presented the "Bronze Eagle" for having sponsored the 1985 winner of the Eagle scout contest.

The San Fernando Valley Chapter was named winner of the President General's Activities Contest for Mid-sized Chapters. Audel H. Hicks accepted the certificate and streamer for our S.A.R. Flag. (See the cover picture) San Fernando Valley's "Valley Com-patriot" was awarded the "Carl F. Bessent Award" for having the finest Chapter news-
letter in the NSSAR.

During the Tuesday business session President Arthur Wm. Barrett introduced a Resolution on the Ladies Auxiliary, which when approved would authorize any of the State Societies to form their own Auxiliary. Our Donald Norman Moran gave the seconding speech. The resolution was voted on and was overwhelmingly approved

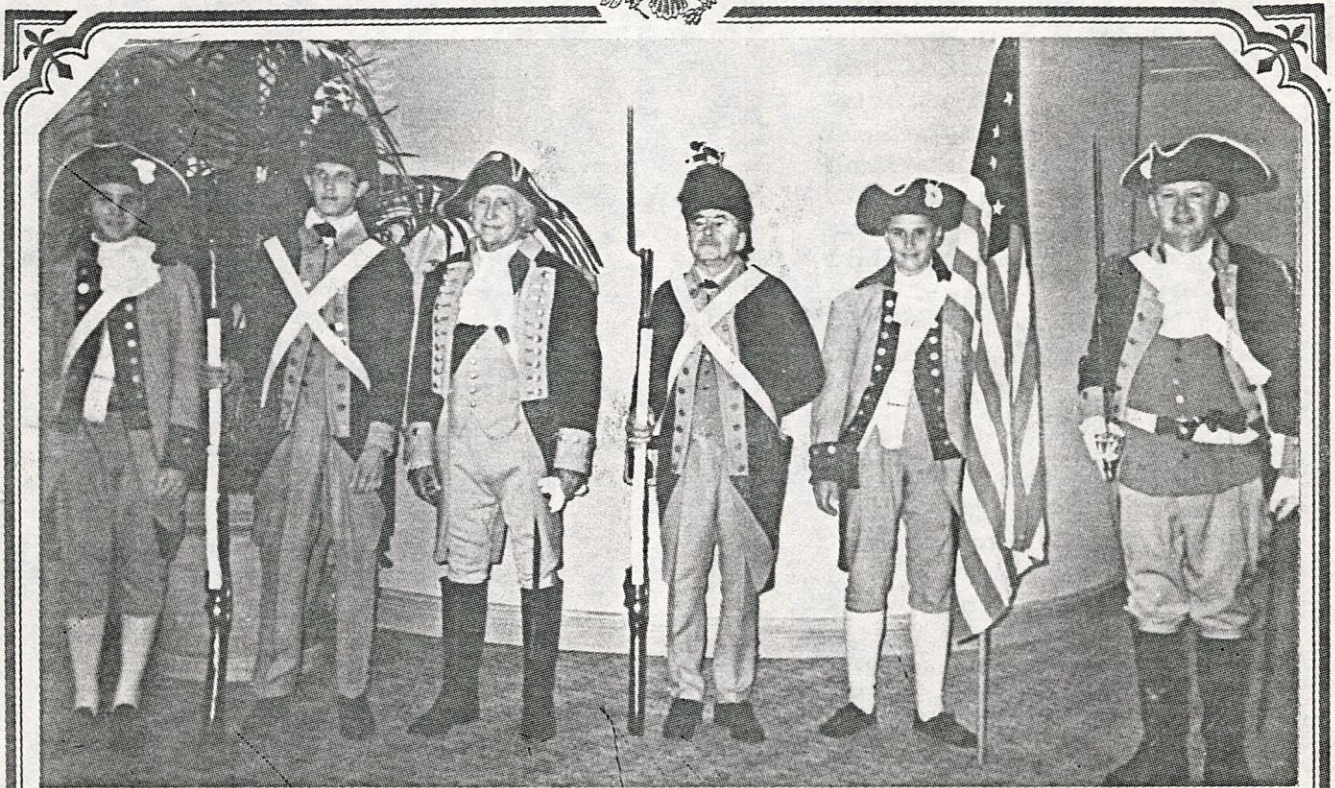

At noon on Tuesday, July 4th, a delegation from the Society, and a Guard of Honor, which included Compatriots Audel H. Hicks and Donald Norman Moran chosen from the Color Guards went to 244 Kearny Street, the exact location where the Sons of the Revolutionary War Sires started, for a special plaque dedication ceremony.

July 4th evening banquet featured Chief Justice John B. Mowbray as speaker who gave a stirring address. It was followed by a special Pageant of flags. The monologue was given by our James Aquirre portraying General George Washington. Three men Colors Guards carried in

each of the San Fernando Valley Chapter supplied flags, with Jim Aquirre portraying George Washington telling thier story. The San Francisco Chapter carried in the flag we had made for the Sons of the Revolutionary War Sires. During the business session on July 5th, Compatriot Audel H. Hicks presented that flag to the National Society to be displayed at the Society's museum in Louisville. The final banquet of the Congress included the swearing in of the National Officers followed by a moving speech by newly elected President General James R. Westlake. On that note the 99th Congress came to a close.

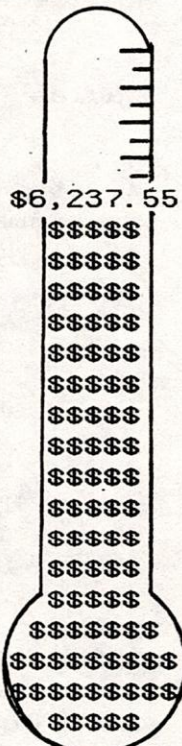

JUNE MEETING MINUTES

26 JUNE 1989



The San Fernando Valley Chapter, S.A.R. held it's June, 1989 meeting at Leon's Steak House in North Hollywood, California at 6:30 P.M. on June 26th, 1989. The presiding officer: Vice President Audel H. Hicks, Sr.

1. THE MAY MEETING MINUTES

IT WAS MOVED by Compatriot James A. McKellep and SECONDED by Compatriot Donald Norman Moran that the minutes of the May 22nd, 1988 Meeting be accepted as published in the Valley Compatriot.

THE MOTION CARRIED.

2. REPORT OF THE TREASURER

Vice President/Treasurer Audel H. Hicks presented a comprehensive Treasurer's report, stating that we have a bank (checking account) balance of \$1,357.10. This is in addition to the monies in the Permanent Fund.

Compatriot Hicks recommended that space be allocated in the Valley Compatriot for a detailed Treasurer's Report and a report from the Trustees of the Permanent Fund. Said combined report to appear at least quarterly. The recommendation was informally approved. The first report to appear in the August issue.

3. THE VETERAN'S BOOK DRIVE

Compatriot Berni K. Campbell, Chairman of the Veteran's Book Drive Committee reported that large quantity of paperback books have been collected and will be delivered to the Sepulveda V.A. Hospital in July.

Compatriot Berni K. Campbell further reported that he has learned that "JIGSAW PUZZLES" are also very much wanted by the Veteran's Hospitals. He has collected twenty-five (25) so far, and will deliver them with the next paperback book delivery. If you have any Jigsaw puzzles stored at home how about donating them to the Veteran's hospital at our next S.A.R. meeting.

4. B.S.A. SCHOLARSHIP DISPLAY

Secretary Donald Norman Moran advised that the Display will be completed shortly. It's construction had to wait because of the 99th National Congress.

5. REPORT ON THE 99th CONGRESS

Secretary Donald Norman Moran reported that the 99th National Society, S.A.R. Congress will be held in San Francisco on July 1st thru 5th. The California Society, S.A.R. is hosting the National convention, and it will be the 100th anniversary of the founding of the Society. Vice President Audel H. Hicks will be leading a large delegation from the Chapter. Additionally, our Color Guard has been manned by volunteers from all over California and will participate in several activities at the Congress. Applicant James Aquilla He will participate in the July Fourth Program as GENERAL GEORGE WASHINGTON will be delivering a speech on the history on the development of Colonial flags and the American flag.

6. OUR R. O. T. C. PROGRAM

The close of the 1988/89 school year is also the end of our R. O. T. C. program for this year. We gave out a total of twenty-three (23) bronze and gold medals (with certificates in folders). This years program was hampered by our inability to secure the required medals from National headquarters. We understand they had problems with their suppliers. We recommend that we place our order for the 1989/90 year very early - in November perhaps.

9. AD IN THE S. A. R. MAGAZINE

Compatriot Audel H. Hicks and Compatriot Donald Norman Moran simultaneously recommended that the Chapter reinstate it's advertizement in the S. A. R. Magazine "WHILE YOUR TRAVELING" section at a cost of \$15.00 per year. IT WAS SO MOVED by Compatriot Berni K. Campbell and SECONDED by Roger E. Robertson THE MOTION CARRIED.

10. DONATION OF FLAG TO NSSAR

IT WAS MOVED by Compatriot Donald Norman Moran and SECONDED by Roger E. Robertson that Compatriot Audel H. Hick, as the senior Chapter officer, make a donation to the National Society's Museum of the "Sons of the Revolutionary Sires" which we had specially made for the 99th Congress flag pageant. It was mentioned that the Chapter would have little use for the flag, but it would make a nice addition to the National Societies collection of flags currently displayed at headquarters. THE MOTION CARRIED.

11. MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE REPORT

Membership Committee Chairman Berni K. Campbell reported that he is presently working on four (4) applications, all of which look extremely good. With the attendance of a fifth applicant and a request for information from a sixth, our 1989 membership drive is off to an excellant start.

12. MEMBERSHIP AD IN THE SCGS'S
"THE SEARCHER"

Compatriot Berni K. Campbell was requested to find out what the cost would be to have a 1/2 page advertizement for membership placed in the Southern California Genealogical Society's "THE SEARCHER's". It was also suggested that we investigate the possiblity of offering to rebate the modest search fee (\$10.00) charged by the S. C. G. S. for finding a revolutionary war ancestor for requestors. That rebate would be deducted from the Chapter's portion of the Membership fee.

THERE BEING NO FURTHER business before the Chapter, the meeting was adjourned.
