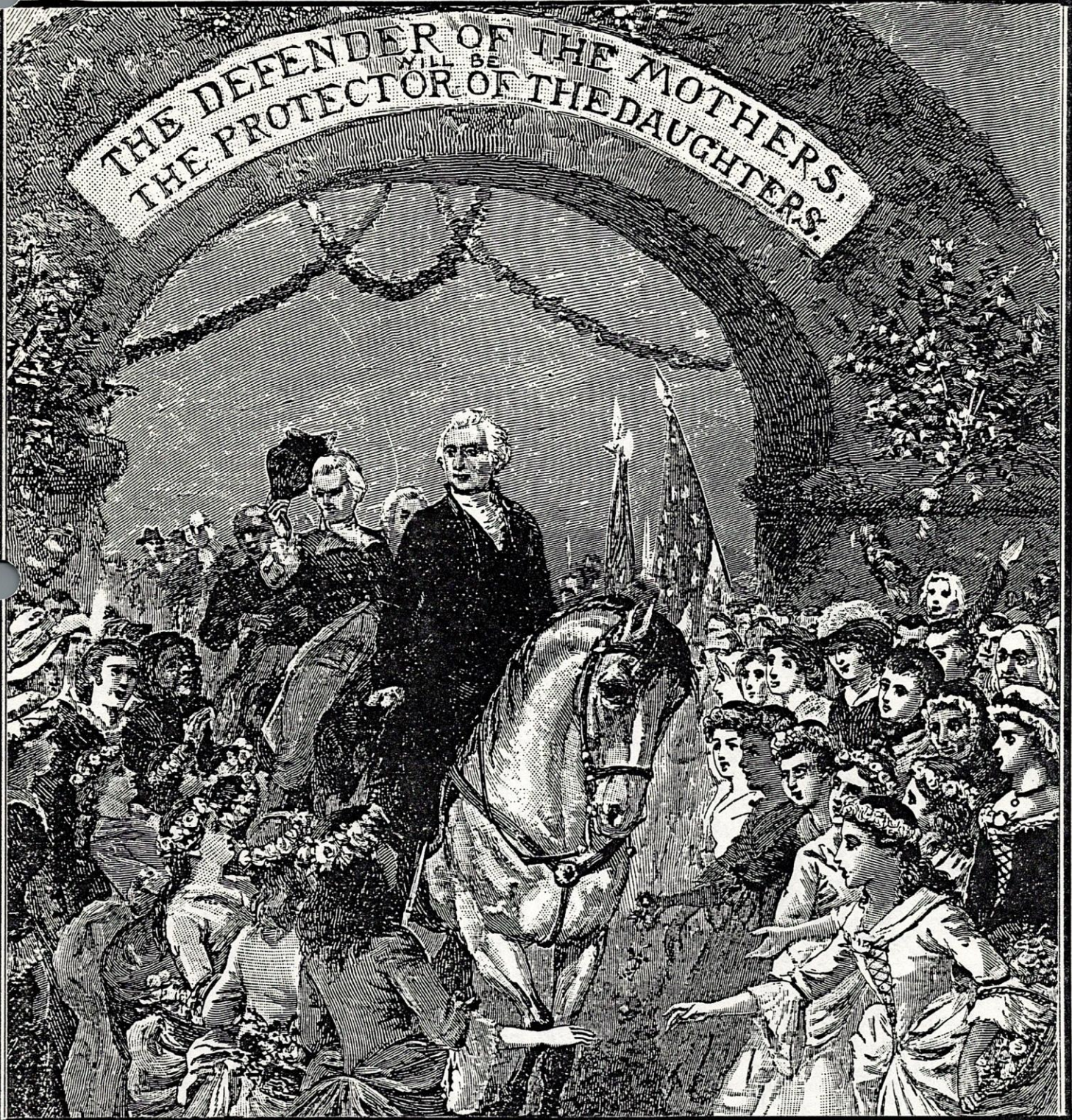

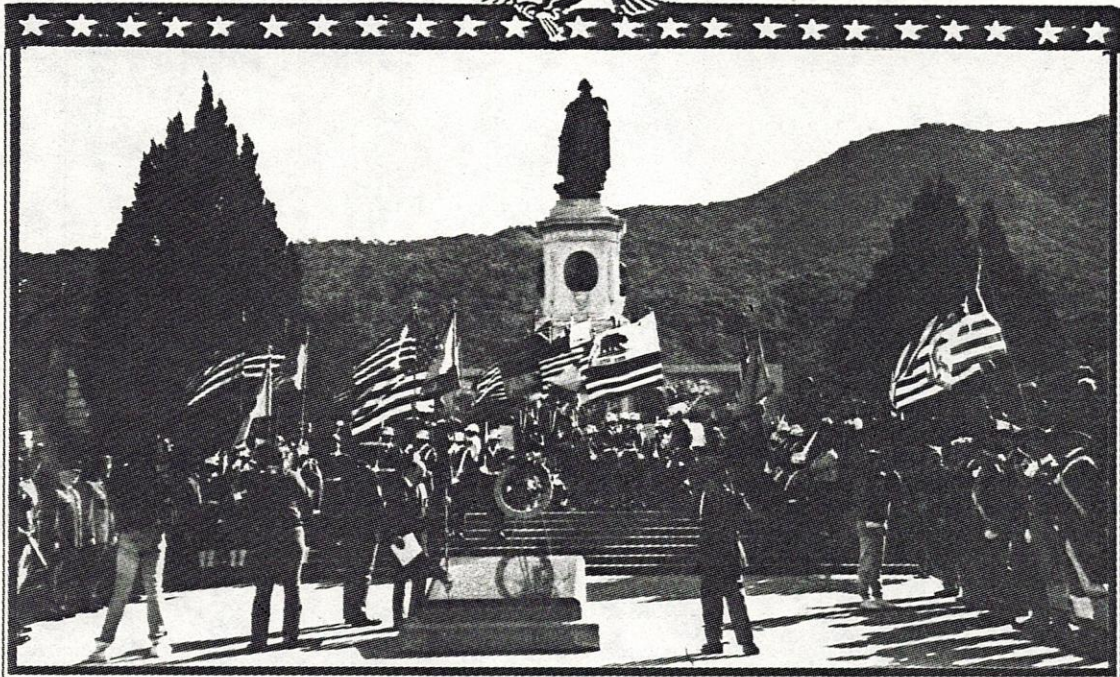

In February 19th, 1990 the Chapter sponsored our annual salute to General George Washington with the Massing of the Colors. Led by President Audel H. Hicks, Sr. this year's event was a great success. The stirring sounds of the American Legion Pipes and Drums led the parade of Color Guards and dignitaries from the Hall of Liberty to the George Washington monument. The twenty-one Color Guards presented a spectacle of patriotic color that brought tears to the spectators eyes. Sergeant-Major Charles Bass assembled the Color Guards at the Monument then turned the podium over to Audel H. Hicks, who welcomed everyone, and the gave is speech on George

Washington. Next to the podium was Tom Hatton of the Society of the Descendants of Washington's Army at Valley Forge. Addressing the assemblage for the Society of the Cincinnati was Col. George A. Eckert, Jr. Following the speeches, our Washington's Life Guards carried the wreath to the monument escorted by Audel H. Hicks, Sr. representing the Society of Washington Family Descendants; Tom Hatton, Colonel George A. Eckert, Compatriot Robert C. Emrey, Jim Aguirre as George Washington and Donald N. Moran Vice President General of the S.A.R. After the wreath laying, each Color Guard passed in review to the martial music of the Pipes and Drums of the Band.

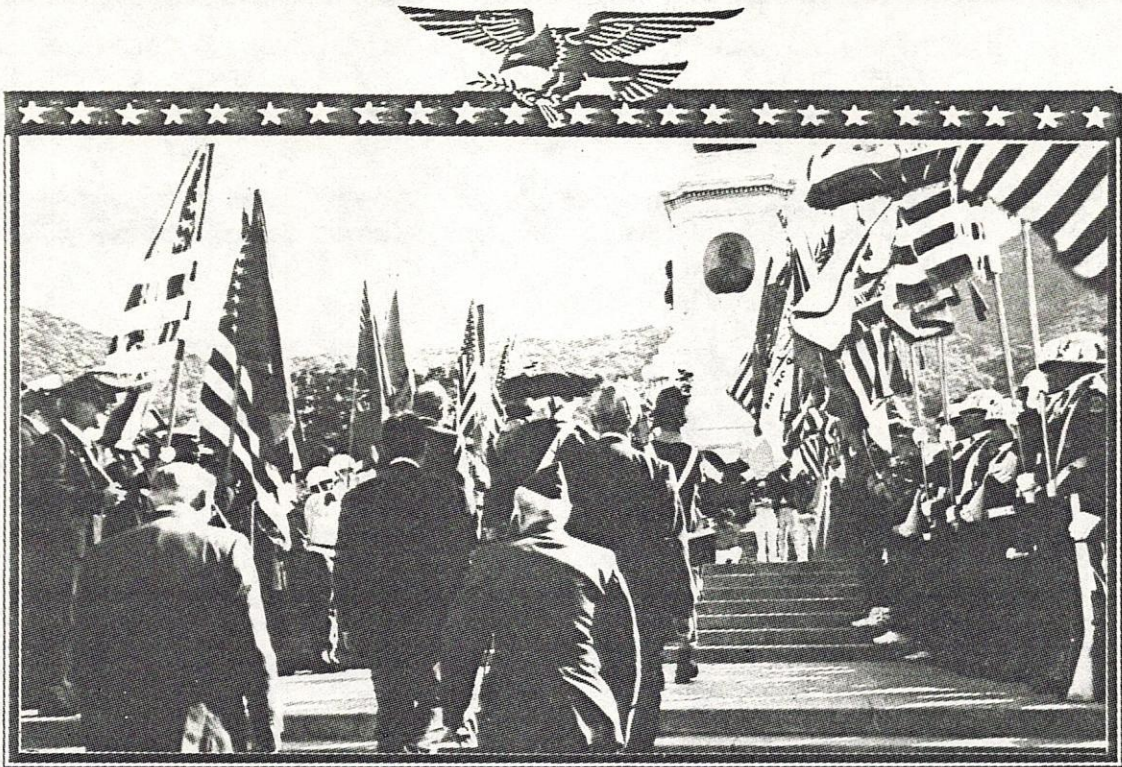

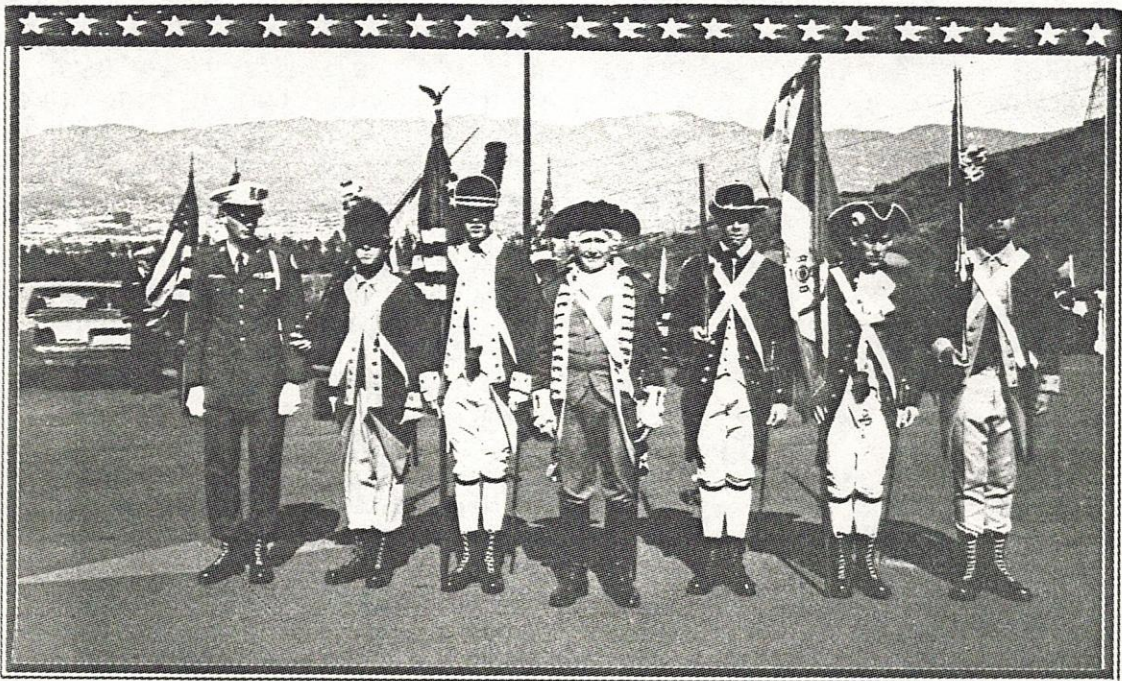

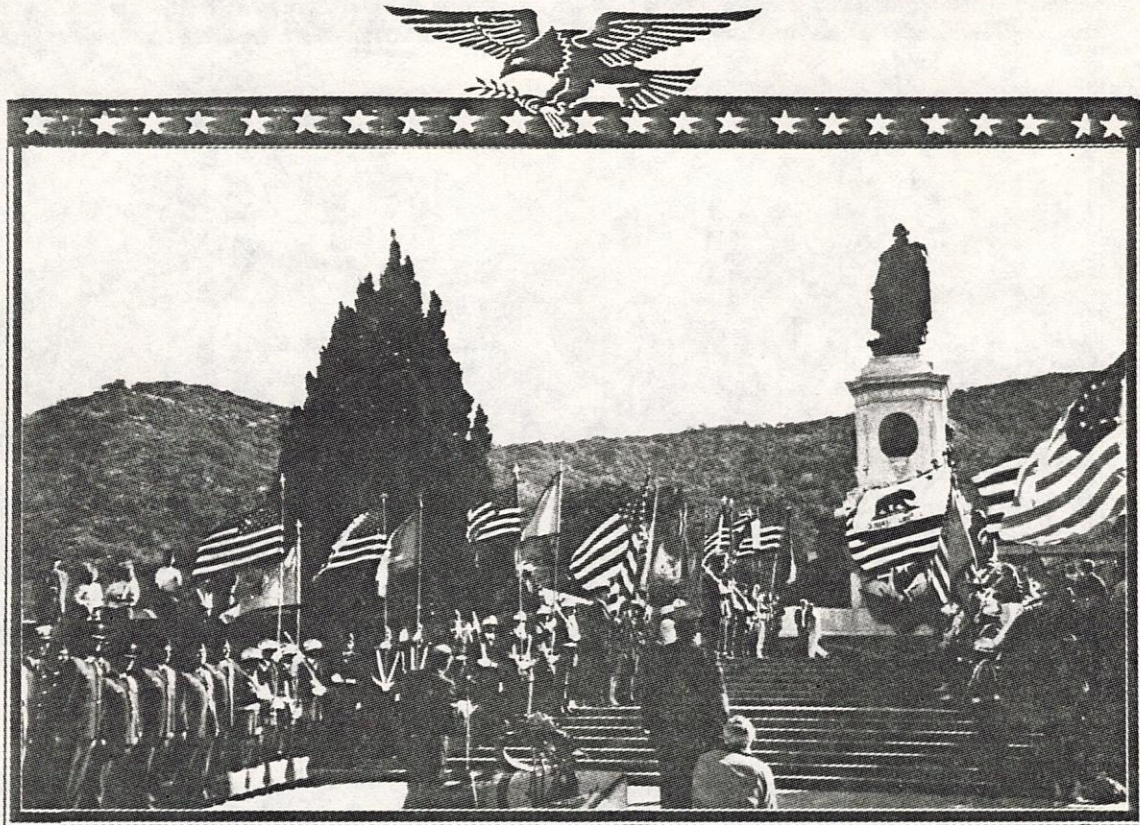

The San Fernando Valley Chapter of the Sons of the American Revolution welcomes you to this commemorative Massing of the Colors to honor General George Washington in celebration of his Birthday. We thank you for taking a few moments of your time to stop and show your respect for this great and good man. We also have a special thanks for you members of Color Guards and for the other participants. This beautiful pageantry and array of colors is truly awe inspiring and fills our inner being with love for AMERICA!

We are not gathered here today to echo the long list of Washington's achievements; you

know them; our first and only Commander-in-Chief during the long, eight years of the Revolutionary War; our first President, elected unanimously twice. That plaque under Lafayette's niche say it all - - PATER PATRIAE! Father of his Country!

It is fitting that we meet here at the base of this memorial to Washington. Thomas Ball, the sculptor, sensed the true, inner man even though it was started in 1850, 51 years after the death of Washington. Since its completion, it has traveled to the Chicago World's Fair in 1893, then to New England and finally to its resting place here in 1958.

Let's look at some of the features of this monument and you will, I'm sure, gain a small and perhaps new insight into the humanity of Washington as the sculptor accurately reflects it.

Note first that there are four figures about 10 1/2 feet tall here on our level. They represent the four most trying periods in this country's history. The first one, to my left, is "Oppression", what would be a beautiful lady, but notice she is downcast, bowed and in chains. This represents America under British rule. Farther to the left there is a strong, masculine, head high, sword in hand! He is "Revolution" Going around the monument, you will next find a beautiful woman, "Victory", who is holding the laurel wreath of victory in one hand and the palm branch of peace in the other. Lastly, just behind me you see "Cincinnatus" - the citizen soldier of Rome. His war is over; he's gone home. His arms and helmet are discarded. We'll have more to say about Cincinnatus later.

Now back to the niches above. Where we find bronzed busts of some of Washington's closest friends and fellow Patriots. First, as we out a short while ago, there is Lafayette, better known in his native France as Marie Joseph Paul Ives Roche Gilbert du Motier, Marquis de Lafayette. At the ripe old age of 19, he was offered and quickly accepted a commission as Major General in the Continental Army. His family's fortunes and influence had nothing to do with it. Regardless Lafayette proved to be one of Washington's bravest and ablest tacticians, trusted friend and devout admirer.

It was said that he was the "spiritual son" of the childless Washington. When our American troops landed in France in 1777, the battle cry became, "Lafayette, we are here!", out of gratitude for his efforts.

The next bronze to the left is that of Major General Nathaniel Green who drove the British out of the South and bottled them up at Yorktown, Virginia, where they later surrendered.

Then we have Major General Lincoln who actually accepted the surrender of Cornwallis at Yorktown.

Last, but certainly not least, there is General Henry Knox. When the war started, the only thing that the 25 year old Knox knew of artillery, he learned from reading his own books in his Boston book store; yet, within a year, he was Chief of Artillery. He was destined to become the Secretary of War for nine years.

The average age of these gentlemen at the start of the War was a young 29.

That leaves the man at the top in a 15 foot likeness - the man we come here today to honor! There he stands reflecting peace. The War is over. The cannon behind him is broken, his sword is sheathed, One of his hands rests on the top of his scabbard while the other is extended as though in friendship - in peace.

Yes, General, rest in peace! Rest with the many fallen Patriots of our beloved Country, the United States of America. We salute you!

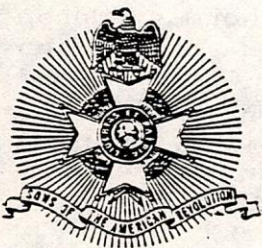
