

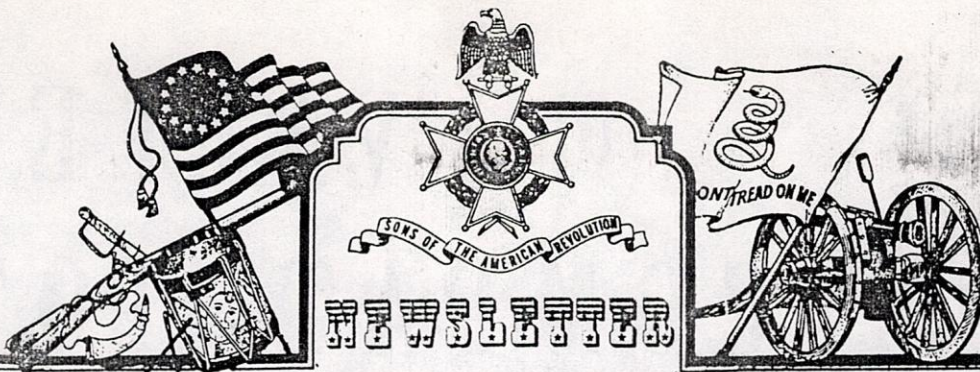

As you can see, the California delegation was the largest, and the San Fernando Valley Chapter well represented.

The tour officially started on August 28th, 1986. We all met at the Rembrandt Hotel (Kensington, London) for a reception - Chuck Vencill buying the first round of drinks. It always pleasant to meet so many of our "Congress" buddies.

Friday, August 29th, started the tour - Chuck Vencill introduced us to Jeff Davis who made a few opening remarks, and at that point we all knew we were going to have a devil of a good time.

Off we went in our luxurious touring coach - thru the streets of London and finally on the "Carriage Way" [Freeway?] - First stop the famous WARWICK CASTLE. This marvelous Castle, until 1978 was the home of the Earls of Warwick. The castle is, as most are, a mixture of several periods. On the northern part of the grounds, within the walls is the site of the Norman Motte and Bailey, said to have been built on the foundations of a Saxon Fort. This overlooked the River Avon. The vast majority of the Castle was rebuilt in the 17th century and the interior periodically up-dated. In 1978 the Castle was purchased by the Tussaud Limited (The Wax Museum people). They have incorporated a display from the early part of this century based upon a series of photographs taken at the time, of the visit of the Prince of Wales to Warwick Castle - the effect was wonderful, not at all a cheap commercial venture would assume. Another interesting item was a mounted knight in full Warwick livery riding about the grounds.

After lunch (which was in a 15th century inn) Jeff drove us to Ann Hathaway's Cottage - A Tudor County Manor and birth place of William Shakespeare's Mother (Ann Hathaway). Than on to Stratford-Upon-Avon. There we all spread out and invaded the famous town of the great playwright. That evening we stayed at the Grosvenor House Hotel in Stratford-Upon-Avon.

Early Saturday morning, following breakfast, we were off again. Driving up the western side of England we stopped in the Lake District (Windermere) for lunch and a few brief hours of sight seeing. The Lake District is considered the most scenic of England and reminded your editor of New England.

Following Lunch we were driven across the Yorkshire Moors - a bleak, if not beautiful landscape - no trees, just rolling grass and heather covered mountains - and sheep. All over the British Isles one finds large flocks of sheep, sometimes in the strangest places. Jeff, our driver told us that there are more sheep than people in England.

We arrived at the Norman city of Durham, visiting its Norman Cathedral, and other sites of historic interest. The Cathedral was begun in 1093 - completed in 1133. It is the shrine of St. Cuthbert who's tomb is still viewed by the public. Durham Castle, like the cathedral overlooks the River Wear. It was begun in 1070. The castle is built on the site of a Saxon Church.

Of particular interest to the SAR is a plaque which is displayed on Durham Cathedral which reads:

Remember in these
Cloisters which were
Finished in his day
JOHN WASHINGTON
of Washington in this county
Prior of this Cathedral Church
1416-1446. Whose family has won
an everlasting name in lands
to him unknown

That evening (the 30th) we arrived at stately Lumley Castle. Situated not far from Durham, in a very scenic setting, Lumley is absolutely beautiful. Despite alterations in both Elizabethan and Georgian times, the castle as we saw it is very much from the 14th century. The Lumley family is said to have had a manor house on the site much earlier. As a matter of genealogical interest, the Lumley's descend from a Saxon Noble named Llylph, a contemporary of William the Conqueror, who was murdered in 1088.

The actual date of the building of the present castle is not known, but it is said to have been started during the reign of Edward I [1272-1307] by Sir Robert Lumley. In 1389 Bishop Skirlaw of Durham granted licence to Ralph, Lord Lumley, to convert the house into a castle. This construction is what we see today - at least the exterior.

The history of the Lumley family is filled with interesting stories and a real live (?) ghost! The Grey Lady. That evening the tour was treated to an Elizabethan banquet, food, drink and entertainment all from that era. Most of us enjoyed being constantly addressed as "Your Lordship", or in the case of our wives, "Your Ladyship". The dinner eaten with knife and fingers, save the soup, which was consumed with the aid of bread, but no spoon.

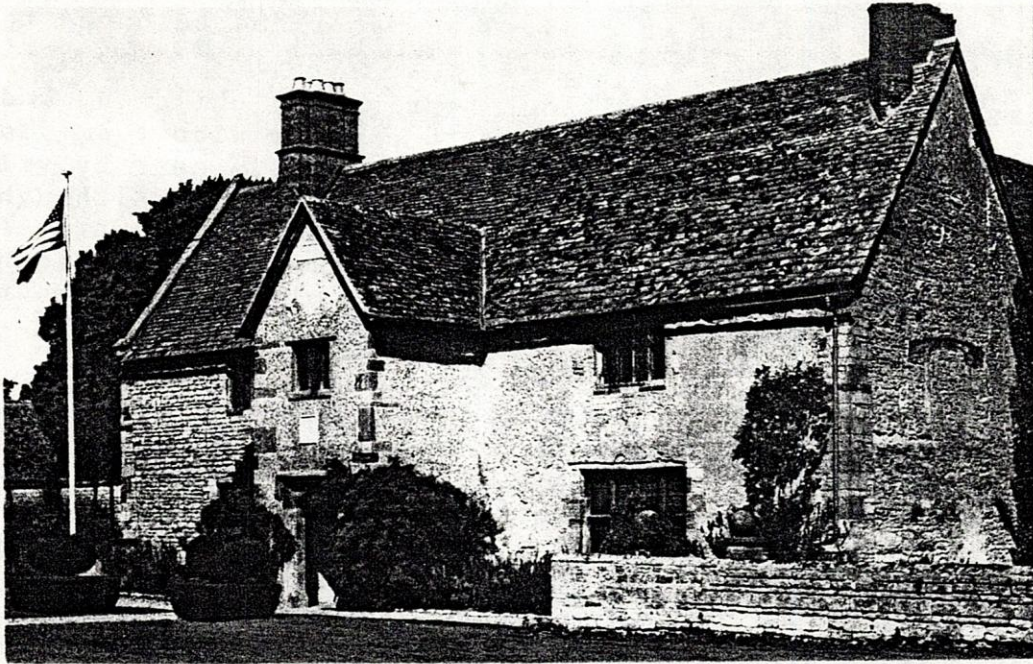
On Sunday morning we arrived at Washington Old Hall, opened specifically for the S.A.R. We have included in this issue of the Valley Compatriot a special story on Washington Old Hall, hence we will not present any details on it here.

We made our way across the Yorkshire country side to the walled City of York. There several informative hours were spent touring this ancient city with its many historic sites of interest.

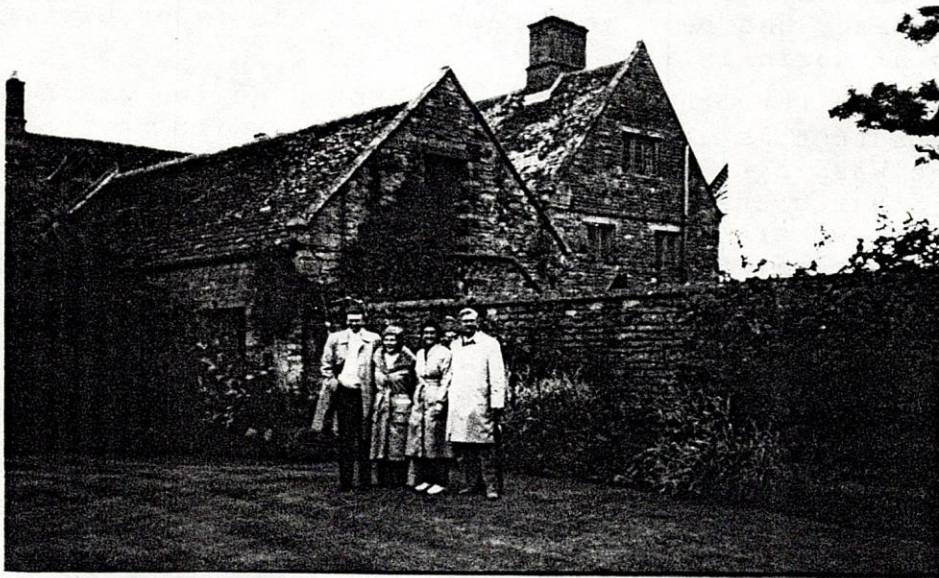
The City of York was established by the Romans in A.D. 71, and developed under them to become the second most important city in England. After the departure of the Romans in the 5th century, York became part of Danelaw, or the Viking area of England. That influence is still found today, in the names of many of the towns, and in many local surnames. The great cathedral, built atop Roman ruins, was started in 1220 and is one of the finest Gothic structures in the world. It was finished in 1472 and represents every period in English architecture. It has 126 windows, containing nearly half the surviving medieval stained glass in Britian. During World War Two, we were told, that Herman Goering forbid the bombing of the Cathedral, because it sat like an arrow facing North, hence acted like a beacon for his luftwaffer. More recently, the Arch Bishop of York appoint a Bishop to a nearby City, who openly denied his belief in several important Christian doctrins - i.e. The Immaculate Conception, the Trinity, etc. There was quite a public outcry within the Church of England, but the Arch Bishop made the appointment anyway - - That night the Great West Tower was struck by lightning and badly damaged! (editor's note: Somethings are better left alone!)

That evening, the 31st, we stayed at a converted early Georgian Manor, Fairfield Manor, in Skelton. The facilities were just great, and after a very good dinner, some of us finished off the day with a rousing game of Bridge (Dori Vencill and Don Moran the big winners)

After a delightful "English" breakfast at Fairfield Manor, we were off again. Jeff Davis managing to get our coach into places most of us would hesitate to take a car! We arrived at Sulgrave Manor, Northamptonshire. This is an ancestral home of George Washington, and one of great interest as it contains many relics of the family, and a few items not seen in this country.

Sulgrave Manor is a small manor-house built about 1500 by Lawrence Washington. He had left Warton where he was employed by Sir William Parr, an uncle of Henry VIII's last Queen. About this time Lawrence married Elizabeth Gough, a widow of a wealthy Woolstapler of Northampton. The family flourished and Lawrence became Mayor of Northampton in 1532. He aquired lands all over the county including the Manor of Sulgrave, which he bought from the Crown for the sum of £ 324 14s 10d in 1539. The manor had belonged to the Priory of St. Andrew.

His first wife died, without bearing any children, and shortly thereafter, Lawrence re-married, to another widow, Amy Tomson, the daughter of Robert Pargiter of Greatworth, a near by village. This union produced four sons and seven daughters. Although the records are scant, we know that Lawrence continued to prosper, and was elected Mayor a second time in 1545. Architurual evidence can fix the completion date of the manor house at 1560, and Lawrence lived another 24 years to enjoy it.

In 1619, Robert, son of Lawrence died, leaving the house to his widow, Anne. However, in 1601, Robert had transferred actual ownership to his cousin Lawrence Makepeace. He took up residence in the Manor in 1626 and the Makepeace family retained ownership until 1659.

In 1914, which marked the centenary of the Treaty of Ghent, and thus a century of peace between Great Britian and the United States (the end of the War of 1812) it was decided to purchase and restore Sulgrave Manor. The purchase price was £8,400 which left only £3,600 for the restoration. A subscription list was opened, headed by H.M. King George V, which raised another £6,000. This was enough to do the job, and on June 21st, 1921 a ceremony was held opening the house to the public. In 1924 an effort was made in the United States to establish a perpetual fund for the Manor, the goal set was \$100,000. They raised \$112,000. As a result, Sulgrave Manor has been well maintained and is an historic Anglo-American historical site.

The tour thru the house is conducted, as you are not permitted to wander about, starts in the Great Hall, With several paintings of George Washington hanging on the walls, including copies of Gilbert Stuarts and Charles Willson Peales. On the Tudor styled leaded windows are stain glass panels of various Washington coats of Arms quartered with other family arms. Off the Great Hall is the "Oak Parlour", so named for its Oak paneling. Hanging in this room is a 1792 original painting of General George Washington by the Scottish Artist Archibald Robertson. He had been commissioned to come to America and paint the famous General for the 11th Earl of Buchan, a collector.

The kitchen is a very good example of a Tudor type, with a great fireplace, filled with all sorts of equipment needed to maintain a Tudor home - including a "Mouse Trap". There are several bedrooms and a musuem room, which includes a lock of George Washington's hair, A velvet coat, Many documents, His saddle Bags, and many other items of extreme interest to the serious historian. Unfortunately, photography is not permitted, nor do they sell brochures of any depth.

Leaving Sulgrave Manor, Jeff headed his coach south to London and back to the Rembrandt Hotel. The following morning, September 2nd, we were off again. A reception at the Lord Mayor of Westminster office in City Hall. Mrs. Terence Mallinson is pictured on the front cover of this publication.

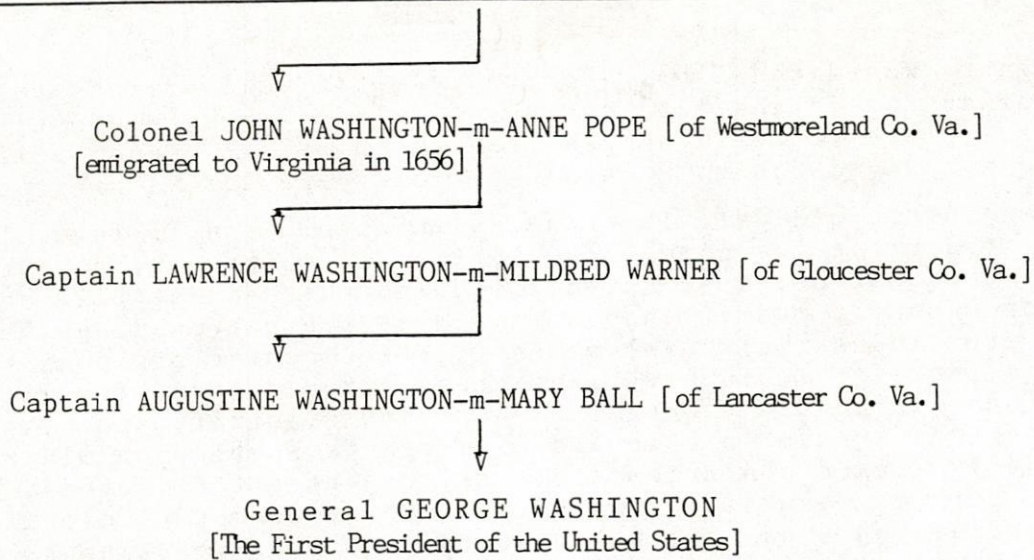
A short time later we found ourselves at the American Club for lunch, and than on to 36 Craven Street, London. This was the residence of Benjamin Franklin for some 19 years. The Earl and Countess of Bessbough are attempting to restore this historic site, but it is in very sad shape and much help will be needed. Since it is the only surviving home of Ben Franklin, a great deal of interest has been raised. President-General Brakebill presented them with a substantial check, and it will no doubt become a fund raising project for the S.A.R.

The concluding activity of the tour was a banquet held at the Savile Club, hosted by the United Kingdom Society, S.A.R. Society President Donald Stearns was presented a meritorious Service medal for all of his activities on behalf of the S.A.R. in Britian. The facilities at the Savile Club were absolutely remarkable, but could never be described in writing.

We must close this report with a compliment to its organizers, Chuck and Dori Vencill - - You did good!



Washington Old Hall



Washington Old Hall, pictured above, is truly the ancestral home of the Washington family in England. Most people think it is Sulgrave Manor, however, the Washington family resided there for about one hundred years. At Washington Old Hall, the family lived for about four hundred and thirty years! The first ancestor of George Washington to live there was William de Hertburn (or Hartburn). In the Boldon Book, which is Durham's counterpart of the Domesday Book and entry read's: "*William de Hertburn held the whole vill, except the Church and the Church lands in exchange for his vill of Hertburn, which he released to the Bishop.....*"

This entry was dated 1183. Fortunately for we Americans today, it was the custom in the 12th century for landowners to adopt the name of there place of residence as their surname - - hence William de Hertburn changed his to Wessyngton, later spelled Washington.

Washington Old Hall is situated in Washington Village, from which it derived its name. The Village is quite old, predating the Norman conquest and is located in the northern industrial and mining area of County Durham. Though the immediate surroundings have suffered from industrial developement, at the center of Washington Village there still is a village green with some older homes about it. There is an old blacksmith shop, now a pottery store, and just off the square on a wooded hill stands Washington Old Hall, much as it looked centuries ago. As you enter the grounds, passing thru a pair of beautiful iron gates, a gift from the Colonial Dames of America, you find what was probably the bothy, dating as far back as the house. It now houses the National Trust's information center and gift shop. Before you stands the old manor house. It is fairly typical of small English country manors.

The manor itself stands, partly, on the old twelfth century foundations, retaining some of the outer walls at the west end and the original letter "H" floor plan. The Great Hall is flanked on either side by a gabled wing. In the middle is the boldly projecting south wing which is the location of the staircase and entrance lobby.

A close examination of the exterior of the struction denotes, clearly, that the entrance was originally on the north side of the Manor, where the elevation is strickly symmetrical. The present stonework shows where a projecting portico had once existed, making the present entrance door the former inter door.

Over the centuries the Manor had been remodeled and modified until we have the present structure. However in 1936, the Manor was to have been demolished, as it was nolonger fit for human inhabitation. A Mr. Frederick Hill formed the local Preservation Society whos sole aim was to save this historic home. They managed to acquire it, and started renovation work immediately. They pulled down modern partitions and other accretions. They stopped a devastating water leak problem and in the course of this work they made the discovery that the original manor-house had not been entirely destroyed in 1613, as previously thought, but that substantial parts of it had been incorporated in its reconstruction. A pillar and part of the two walled-up arches to the kitchen were discovered and so was the arched head of the west wall window. In brief, a good portion of the manor-house dated back to its very origins - TO THE TIME WILLIAM de WESSYINGTON TOOK POSSESSION OF IT IN 1183!

Unfortunately, the Washington Old Hall was not endowed when it was taken over by the National Trust, hence it does not have a steady source of income to continue the job of preserving this Anglo-American Historic treasure.

Your editor believes that raising funds for the support of this ancient site is most worthwhile and should be a San Fernando Valley

Chapter, S.A.R. project. Our brother chapters in the east frequently support local Revolutionary War or other historical sites - for us here in California there is little for us to support in the area of our special interests - this may be ideal for us.

Whether a Chapter project or not, the curator of Washigton Old Hall presented your Secretary with a number of beautiful "Gift Acknowledgement" certificates, which we have reproduced below. You will note on the certificate two lines reading "to maintain this property for a period ofhours" The curator advised that it costs the National Trust about \$10.00 per hour to keep it up to standards. A part of that amount is for an endowment fund, another part is for continued restoration.

2. APPROVAL OF THE MINUTES OF THE MAY 30th MEETING

4. TREASURER'S REPORT

5. VETERAN'S BOOK DRIVE COMMITTEE

Committee Chairman, Bernie K. Campbell reported that another THREE HUNDRED Paperback books were delivered to the Veteran's Hospital in Sepulveda. The book drive is continuing and we will start delivering books to the Sawtelle V.A. Hospital in Los Angeles this forthcoming fall.

6. EAGLE SCOUT SCHOLARSHIP PROPOSAL

The proposal to establish a scholarship award at the Chapter level was discussed and it was decided that the matter should be referred to the State Society. Compatriots George S. Van Dorn and Donald Norman Moran are to take the matter up at the next Board of Managers meeting this fall.

7. S.A.R. TOUR OF ENGLAND

12. BICENTENNIAL DISPLAY OF THE CONSTITUTION

It was informally approved that the Chapter Secretary investigate the extent of displaying the Bicentennial Display offered at the National Congress. If adequate, the Chapter authorizes the sum of \$100.00 to be spent.

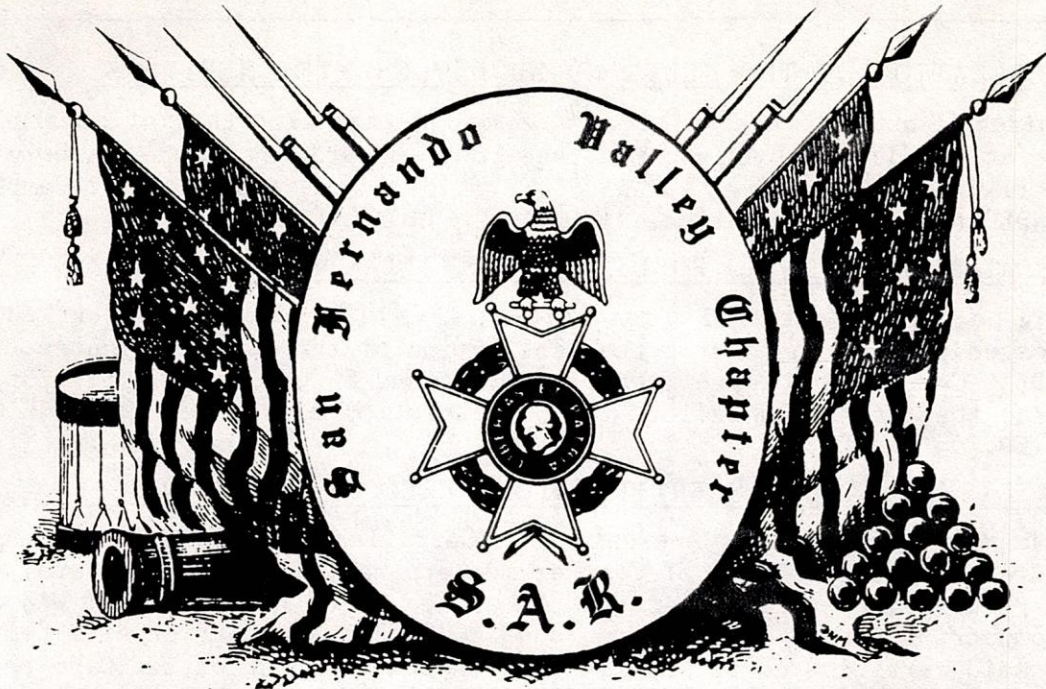
14. S.A.R. MEDALS
